A. Price and Payment

A.1 Price

The Contractor shall provide an estimate of 6,000 classes to be given at a firm fixed price per session in Colombian Pesos COP\$. Sessions shall be one hour in length and shall be scheduled between Monday and Friday 07:00 am to 6:00 pm. No more than six students will be part of any class, unless mutually agreed upon by the Contractor and the Government.

B. Definitions

B.1 "COR" means Contracting Officer's Representative; see FAR 52.212-4 Contract Terms and Conditions – Commercial Items, in Section 2.

"Government" means the United States Government unless otherwise stated.

C. Performance Work Statement

C.1 For each year of the contract, the U.S. Government guarantees a minimum order of 1,000 sessions. The maximum amount of sessions each year of this contract will not exceed 7,000.

C.2 Individual purchases shall be documented as follows: Delivery Order (See Attach 1)

C.3 The Contractor shall provide foreign language instruction to adult students that focuses on the general interest and conversational skills typically found in mass-media publications for the foreign language speaking public. The Contractor shall develop the instruction to include the development of speaking, listening, and reading skills to permit face to face conversation. All instruction shall also include job relevant language terminology and usage of the designated field of interest.

C.4 Instruction shall be based on proficiency, communication, and academic principles as used in foreign language learning institutions identified below.

- Department of State, Foreign Service Institute;
- Department of Defense, Defense Language Institute

C.5 The Office of Personnel Management shall define the language proficiency levels identified as desired outcomes. All students shall be measured on their language proficiency levels in accordance with the Foreign Service Instituted Language Proficiency Test.

D. Period of Performance

D.1 The period of performance is one (1) base year from July 27, 2009 to July 26, 2010, plus two one-year options to extend.

D.2 Class shall be given Monday through Friday from 07:00 am to 6:00 pm in the following location:

E. Requirements

The Contractor shall provide the following:

- Proof of a minimum of five (5) years experience coordinating Spanish Language Instruction to non-native Spanish speakers, AND an advanced degree in teaching, preferably teaching languages.
- Proof of an available staff of a minimum of 5 or more instructors, including the Contractor, each with a minimum of three (3) years experience of Spanish Language instruction to non-native Spanish speakers, and bachelor's degree in modern languages OR 10 years of teaching experience and/or FSI Spanish training.
- Diplomas or Certifications to support above.
- All instructors must have a minimum of 3/3 (Speaking/Reading) in English as determined by the Human Resources Office (HRO).
- Availability and Flexibility in scheduling and instruction locations.
- Supervision of all instructors and performance of quality assurance in meeting the objectives and goals for that training.
- Other required classroom materials such as newspapers, magazines, dictionaries, or photocopied materials, written in the designated language for use by students in exercises or testing.
- Copy of the Certificado de Constitución y Gerencia issued by Cámara de Comercio.

F. Contractor Furnished Property

F.1 The Contractor shall provide all instructional materials including texts, class exercises, handouts, tests, and audio-visual media.

F.2 The Contractor shall provide all necessary site support materials and equipment, including items such as expendable/consumable classroom supplies (i.e. paper, pencils, pens, chalk, markers and binders). The Contractor shall replenish such expendable/consumable items as needed to provide for the performance of the work.

F.3 The Contractor shall provide qualified instructor(s), who are well versed in all topics to be covered, capable of answering in-depth questions on each topic. He/she will provide the required training in a classroom setting based on the schedule of training modules or lessons and the objectives and goals for that training.

F.4 The Contractor shall provide an instructor supervisor who will supervise the performance of work under the contract, and who will perform quality assurance in meeting the objectives and goals for that training.

F.5 The Contractor shall provide other required classroom materials such as newspapers, magazines, dictionaries, or photocopied materials, written in the designated language for use by students in exercises or testing.

G. Government-Furnished Property

The US Government will provide some necessary site support materials and equipment, including items such as:

- Government classrooms
- Suitable work areas, i.e. desks and chairs
- One (1) computer system with Internet access
- Chalkboard or erasable marker-whiteboard
- Television Set with DVD Player
- Telephone

H. Specific Tasks

The contractor shall provide instructional Foreign Language Training services at the firm fixed prices shown in this contract. The objectives of each training module or lesson are to prepare all students as efficiently and effectively as possible to accomplish the goals of the training.

H.1 GOALS OF FOREIGN LANGUAGE TRAINING

The goal of training is to provide the student with the skills and knowledge necessary to reach the desired level of performance as identified in the training modules or lessons identified below:

H.1.1 ORAL RECOGNITION AND RESPONSE MODULE

Each student, at the completion of training, shall be able to perform at the required level of proficiency. When engaged in social conversation, the student will be able to communicate with the Spanish speaking public, carrying on an appropriately worded and pronounced dialogue in the correct dialect and grammar. At least 85% of the students tested in each class shall be able to answer correctly at least 90% of the selected vocabulary questions when used in conversational exchange.

H.1.2 READING COMPREHENSION MODULE

Each student, at the completion of training, shall be able to perform the required level of proficiency. The student will be able to recognize designated key phrases or questions in Spanish, from the selected vocabulary when reading written communication or letters. The student must then respond appropriately, providing the requested information by selecting the correct reply, or by properly identifying the functional organization whom the written communication was intended. At least 85% of the students completing training for each class will be able to comprehend and appropriately respond to or determine the intended addressee for at least 90% of the written communications in which the selected vocabulary is presented.

H.1.3 STUDENT TESTING

The Contractor shall administer tests on knowledge and proficiency as a required element of evaluating the student's progress in the training module or lesson. The Contractor shall provide these tests periodically to:

- determine the student's progress in training;
- identify areas of weakness where supplemental training may be needed; and,
- quantify the student's then-current level of knowledge and proficiency.

Initial testing will be used to establish a baseline for measurement of knowledge and proficiency obtained, and may be used in a predictive manner to facilitate personal training planning.

The Contractor shall use tests recognized and accepted by national professional associations and organizations identified below.

- Modern Language Association of America
- American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages
- Foreign Service Institute
- Foreign Language Center within Defense Language Institute
- Federal Interagency Language Round table
- or other nationally recognized foreign language bodies.

H.1.4 STUDENT PROGRESS DOCUMENTATION AND TRAINING RECOMMENDATIONS

The instructor will document the student's progress as measured performance under each lesson module. The Contractor shall prepare training recommendations that state specific plans for remedial, or supplementary use of supportive training materials, or use of tutoring and personalized training techniques.

K. Quality Assurance and Surveillance Plan (QASP).

This plan is designed to provide an effective surveillance method to promote effective contractor performance. The QASP provides a method for the Contracting Officer's Representative (COR) to monitor contractor performance, advise the contractor of unsatisfactory performance, and notify the Contracting Officer of continued unsatisfactory performance. The contractor, not the Government, is responsible for management and quality control to meet the terms of the contract. The role of the Government is to conduct quality assurance to ensure that contract standards are achieved.

K.1 SURVEILLANCE. The COR will receive and document all complaints from Government personnel regarding the services provided. If appropriate, the COR will send the complaints to the Contractor for corrective action.

K.2 STANDARD. The performance standard is that the Government receives no more than two (2) customer complaint per month. The COR shall notify the Contracting Officer of the complaints so that the Contracting Officer may take appropriate action to enforce the inspection clause (FAR 52.212-4, Contract Terms and Conditions-Commercial Items), if any of the services exceed the standard.

K.3 PROCEDURES.

- (a) If any Government personnel observe unacceptable services, either incomplete work or required services not being performed they should immediately contact the COR.
- (b) The COR will complete appropriate documentation to record the complaint.
- (c) If the COR determines the complaint is invalid, the COR will advise the complainant. The COR will retain the annotated copy of the written complaint for his/her files.

- (d) If the COR determines the complaint is valid, the COR will inform the Contractor and give the Contractor additional time to correct the defect, if additional time is available. The COR shall determine how much time is reasonable.
- (e) The COR shall, as a minimum, orally notify the Contractor of any valid complaints.
- (f) If the Contractor disagrees with the complaint after investigation of the site and challenges the validity of the complaint, the Contractor will notify the COR. The COR will review the matter to determine the validity of the complaint.
- (g) The COR will consider complaints as resolved unless notified otherwise by the complainant.
- (h) Repeat customer complaints are not permitted for any services. If a repeat customer complaint is received for the same deficiency during the service period, the COR will contact the Contracting Officer for appropriate action under the Inspection clause.

L. IDENTIFICATION OF CONTRACTORS

(B) The IRS has filed a notice of Federal tax lien with respect to an assessed tax liability, and the taxpayer has been issued a notice under I.R.C. §6320 entitling the taxpayer to request a hearing with the IRS Office of Appeals contesting the lien filing, and to further appeal to the Tax Court if the IRS determines to sustain the lien filing. United States person means any United States resident or national (other than an individual resident outside the United States and employed by other than a United States person), any domestic concern (including any permanent domestic establishment of any foreign concern), and any foreign subsidiary or affiliate (including any permanent foreign establishment) of any domestic concern which is controlled in fact by such domestic concern, as provided under the Export Administration Act of 1979, as amended.

(b) Certification. By submitting this offer, the offeror certifies that it is not:

(1) Taking or knowingly agreeing to take any action, with respect to the boycott of Israel by Arab League countries, which Section 8(a) of the Export Administration Act of 1979, as amended (50 U.S.C. 2407(a)) prohibits a United States person from taking; or,

(2) Discriminating in the award of subcontracts on the basis of religion.
